New Projects Under Way

A note from Mayor Garret Nancolas

Spring . . . a time of new beginnings. New grass, new leaves on the trees, fresh spring flowers blooming everywhere—what a beautiful city we live in.

You have probably noticed some new demolition going on as well, and the beginnings of new construction in several areas of Caldwell. The College of Idaho just received a wonderful donation to build the brand-new Cruzen-Murray Library on the college campus. While it is a college library, it will also serve and benefit our community. Just another example of a great community partnership.

We just had a groundbreaking for the Roberts Recreation Center adjacent to the swimming pool in Memorial Park. Rob and Nancy Roberts donated the steel structure for a building that was donated to the Police Athletic League (PAL) and the City of Caldwell. And together, as a partnership between PAL and the City, we are going to build a new recreation facility that will house programs for the families, the youth, and the citizens of our community.

Another new park is also on the way—the north end of Whittenberger Park is being repurposed for the new Dog Park with the bulk of the work being completed this summer. More information coming as the project continues.

Progress continues on the Indian Creek Plaza development and the Veteran's Memorial Hall. Further plans on the horizon include the Trolley Square Redevelopment Project. Our ultimate goal is that people will come downtown and walk around this beautiful creek to enjoy something at the plaza, then walk over to the movie theater, or browse the downtown businesses and purchase items, or perhaps visit one of our many restaurants.

Caldwell has many fun, exciting activities and experiences to offer our community; take a chance and try something new!

Republic Services Spring Cleanup Days: April 18-23rd

Items that can be put out on the curb:

- Tree branches/shrubs—cut and tied in 4-ft bundles, weighing 60 pounds or less
- Bagged grass clippings, leaves, etc
- Small household items
- Large and small furniture items
- Non-Freon appliances
- Boxes— weighing up to 30 pounds
- Carpet/vinyl pieces—rolled in 4-ft lengths, weighing 60 pounds or less
- Miscellaneous household debris in tied trash bags

No hazardous waste, such as paint, paint thinner, tires, fertilizer, household/pool chemicals, motor oil, anti-freeze or appliances with Freon.

Landfill: Canyon County will waive landfill fees for Canyon County residents from 8-12 noon on Saturday April 23rd


Guidelines:

- >Residential clean-up waste up to one ton will be accepted without charge. Waste in excess of one ton will be charged at regular rate.
- >One refrigeration unit will be accepted free of charge per household
- >Up to 4 passenger car/light truck tires will be accepted per household. Additional tires will be charged at regular rate. Larger tires will not be accepted.
- >Wood waste, metal, tires, and refrigeration units should be separated from all other waste. Treated wood waste will be accepted.








Climb. Conquer. Cure.


National Library Week: April 10 – 16
